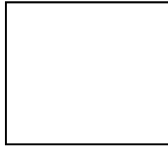

Tick Talk: Be Ready For Ticks

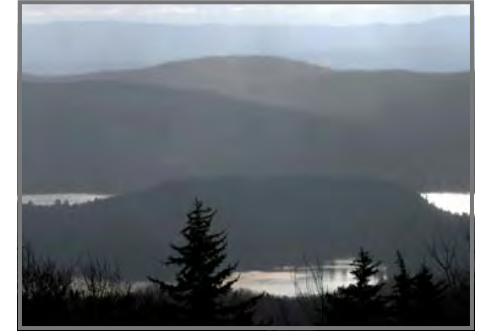

The workshops will focus on a number of different topics from maple sugaring to tick bite prevention. Some workshops will be field outings and some will be indoor lectures. Backyard Maple Sugaring
Tuesday, February 2, 6-8 p.m.

Have you thought about making your own maple syrup? Do you want to know what's needed? This special workshop is geared to first-timers and beginners with fewer than 75 taps. All aspects of maple sugaring will be covered, including tree identification and tapping, collecting and boiling sap, finishing, filtering, and packing syrup. Equipment and supplies needed, especially sizing and operating small evaporators, homemade and commercial, will be discussed.

Where the Wild Things Are: Robb Reservoir

Join Harris Center senior naturalist Meade Cadot for a not-too-difficult wild-life tracking excursion in this remote corner of Cheshire County. Protected in 2007 and now owned by the Harris Center, the 1,667-acre Robb Reservoir tract is a "forest legacy" for black bear, moose, bobcat, and other wide-ranging species. We'll venture out for 2½ hours or so at a moderate pace to seek signs of the likely suspects: river otter, mink, weasel, bobcat, moose, and fisher. Meet at the Harris Center at 9 a.m. to carpool the 10-minute ride to the Robb Reservoir entrance off Route 123 in Stoddard.
